PERCYLITE.

SIR,—I beg to call your attention to some specimens of this rare mineral from a new locality, viz.—Mina San Rafael, Galeria al Norte, Bolivia, from which place I have found the above together with other interesting and, I think, new minerals. It is mostly in a massive state, but in small fissures and cavities are microscopic cubic crystals, transparent and of a fine blue color, the massive part, which is sometimes rather friable, gives the reactions of chlorine, lead, and copper, so I think there is but little doubt of its being Percylite.
