Proceedings of the Fifty-fifth Annual Meeting of the Mineralogical Society of America in Miami, Florida

The fifty-fifth annual meeting of the Society was held on November 17–20, 1974, at the Deauville and Carillon Hotels in Miami, Florida. There were three technical sessions in mineralogy, four in petrology, and a Symposium, "Some Modern Concepts In Metamorphism," arranged by Derrill M. Kerrick. All these sessions were, as usual, integrated with those of the Geological Society of America and its other affiliated societies.

The retiring President, S. W. Bailey, addressed the Society on the morning of November 19th on the subject "Cation Ordering and Pseudosymmetry in Layer Silicates."¹ The annual luncheon of the Society was held in the Richelieu Room of the Deauville Hotel on November 19th. The Roebling Medal was awarded to Ralph E. Grim, who was introduced by Haydn H. Murray, and the Mineralogical Society of America Award was given to James J. Papike, who was introduced by David B. Stewart.

The annual business meeting of the Society was held on the morning of November 19th in the Empire Room, Carillon Hotel, at which time reports were presented by the Secretary, the Treasurer, and the Editor of *The American Mineralogist*. About 50 people attended and there was lively discussion, particularly about future Short Courses and the various aspects of page charges.

Prior to the meeting, a Short Course on Sulfide Mineralogy, organized by Paul H. Ribbe, was held at the Sheraton Four Ambassadors Hotel in Miami, November 15–17. The lecturers were B. J. Wuensch, C. T. Prewitt, V. Rajamani, S. D. Scott, J. R. Craig, and P. B. Barton; 77 people attended the course. The lecture notes were incorporated into a paperbound volume, *Sulfide Mineralogy*, which was on sale during the meeting at the Society's booth in the exhibits area. The booth also featured an exhibit prepared by the Managing Editor, Mary Holliman, showing how *The American Mineralogist* is assembled for publication.

Actions of the 1974 Council

The second meeting of the 1974 Council was held

on April 9, 1974, at the Geophysical Laboratory, Washington, D. C. The third meeting was held on November 17, 1974, at the Carrillon Hotel, Miami, Florida. The principal actions taken by the Council at these two meetings are summarized here.

Awards

The Council voted to award two Roebling Medals in 1975, one to Michael Fleischer and one to O. Frank Tuttle. The Mineralogical Society of America Award for 1975 will be given to Roger G. Burns.

The Council has now voted unanimously to honor the distinguished mineralogist who is the last surviving founder, Edgar T. Wherry, by appointing him the fourth Honorary President. Executive Secretary

By unanimous vote of the Council, A. F. Spilhaus, Jr., was appointed Executive Secretary.

Scholarships

Fifty-nine applications were received for the scholarships to students made possible by contributions from the membership. A committee composed of J. J. Finney, Cornelis Klein, Jr., and D. R. Peacor selected the 14 best applications, and the Council chose two from that group to receive scholarships of \$500 each. The winners were graduate students Michael S. Fulp, University of Tulsa, Oklahoma, and Jeffrey K. Greenberg, University of Kentucky, Lexington.

Short Courses

The Council unanimously authorized the Treasurer to handle the financial affairs of the Society, including buying and selling stocks and signing expressed the appreciation of the Society for his excellent and effective organization of the Short Course on Sulfide Mineralogy.

Actions of the 1975 Council

The first meeting of the 1975 Council was held at noon Wednesday, November 20, 1974, at the Carillon Hotel, Miami, Florida.

The Council unanimously authorized the Treasurer to handle the financial affairs of the Society, including buying and selling stocks and signing contracts; he may delegate such authority consistent with the advisory resolutions passed by the Council. In the event the Treasurer is unavailable or incapacitated, the President is authorized to sign checks subject to receiving sufficient documentation. The Executive Secretary is authorized to sign checks up to \$5,000 in amount.

Publications

The honorarium for the Editor was increased to \$2,000. The appointment of Mrs. Mary Holliman as Managing Editor was renewed. The Council accepted with great regret the resignation of the Editor, to become effective in October, 1975. The Publications Committee and the Executive Committee were given responsibility for bringing to the Council names of potential candidates who could fill the vacancy. By an announcement in the November-December issue of *The American Mineralogist*, nominations were requested from the members.

Spring Meeting of the Council

The 1975 Council will hold its second meeting at its headquarters in Washington, D. C., during the month of April, 1975.

Committees and Other Appointive Officers

A list of appointive officers, prepared by the President and his Committee on Committees, was presented to the Council. With some changes made by the Council, the list was completed and approved.

Charitable Fund

The Council voted unanimously to change the name of this fund to Scholarship Fund.

Report of the Treasurer for 1974

This report covers the period January 1, 1974, through December 31, 1974, denoted FY 1974. During this period, accounting was done on the accrual basis, and the figures for this period are therefore comparable with those of FY 1973. They are not directly comparable with preceding years, when accounting was on a modified cash basis.

The financial data for the period covered are presented in Tables 1 (Combined Balance Sheet) and 2 (Statement of Income and Expense, FY 1974). Both tables are basically similar to those presented in last year's report. The only substantive changes in the Balance Sheet reflect transfer of our investment portfolio from Merrill-Lynch to Ruane, Cunniff, and

Stires, a New York-based investment counseling firm; the renaming of the Charitable Fund as the Scholarship Fund, by Council action; and the establishment of the Membership Assistance Fund. The Membership Assistance Fund was established by Council in 1973 to pay the annual dues of members for whom dues payments pose a serious financial hardship. The format of the statement of income and expense is also essentially the same as that of last year's report. Once again the Society experienced a net financial gain on its operations, but the gain was substantially less than last year's period. The principal reason for the reduced gain is the sharp increase in cost of publishing The American Mineralogist. This is due in part to increased costs connected with the publication process but it is largely due to the fact that we published 1377 pages in The American Mineralogist this year, as opposed to 1150 pages the previous year. Also notable is the substantial increase in activity of the Revolving Fund. The small net loss incurred by the Revolving Fund reflects expenditures connected with the publication of the notes for the Short Course on Sulfide Mineralogy presented at the annual meetings in November, and some of the sales reflect sales of these short course notes. But I am hap-

py to report that a substantial portion of these sales reflect sales of previously published special papers; during the past year the inventory of special papers has declined by 20 percent.

As reported by the outgoing treasurer, Philip M. Bethke, at the November Council meeting, the financial condition of the Society is sound and we appear to be in a good position to weather the difficult economic conditions of the next several years.

However, it is clear that the days of the budget surplus are numbered and the Council and its committees must, therefore, begin to identify non-essential services, cost-cutting procedures, and methods of increasing income other than by raising dues and subscriptions. During these deliberations, we will be relying heavily on help and advice from the membership.

Report of Audit

The Council Mineralogical Society of America:

I have examined the balance sheets of the Mineralogical Society of America as of December 31, 1974 and 1973, and the related statements of income for the years then ended. My examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as I considered necessary in the circumstances.

In my opinion the financial statements mentioned above present fairly the financial position of the Mineralogical Society of America at December 31, 1974 and 1973, and the results of its operations for the years then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Report of the Financial Advisory Committee for 1974

As a result of a comprehensive survey by this committee of the financial needs of the Society, our internal capabilities for investment managment, and alternative mechanisms of external management, in late 1973 the portfolio of the Society was entrusted on a fee basis to the supervision of Mr. Sidney H. Stires of the management firm of Ruane, Cunniff, and Stires of New York City. The performance of the portfolio is monitored by this committee on the basis of quarterly reports by Mr. Stires, and the management agreement can be terminated if the Society is not satisfied with performance. The assets of the Endowment Fund, the Revolving Fund, and the Charitable Fund have been pooled in a Consolidated Fund for efficiency of investing and accounting. Investment income and capital gains or losses from the Consolidated Fund are distributed to the individual Funds on the basis of their percentage participation.

With the exception of a few bonds, the 1973 portfolio has been completely restructured to give a larger ratio of bonds to common stocks as well as a change in the industries represented by the equities. Capital gains and losses resulting in 1974 from this restructuring are listed in Table 1. Dividends plus interest in 1974 amounted to \$13,116.36. The composition of the portfolio and its market value as of December 31, 1974, are given in Table 2. The total -

market value of \$261,249, after allowance for reinvestment of income and the addition of \$50,000 in cash to the fund during March, represents a decrease of 21 percent from the 1973 year-end total. During this same period the Dow Jones Industrial Average declined by 28 percent and the Standard & Poor 500 Stock Average by 30 percent. If the portfolio had not been restructured, its market value would have declined by 46 percent during 1974.

The present portfolio is considered relatively conservative with 41 percent of the present market value in corporate bonds, convertible bonds, and cash. Several of the bonds are medium-term discount bonds that provide a yield to maturity of about 10 percent. The equities are concentrated in data processing and certain other stocks that appear to offer above average growth potential. Because of the depressed and sometimes erratic nature of both the stock market and of economic prospects, these holdings will be reviewed periodically.

This report for 1974 was prepared by the 1975 committee. We wish to acknowledge the debt of the Society to the three retiring committee members, H. S. Yoder, Jr., Daniel E. Appleman, and Philip M. Bethke, who were primarily responsible for the reorganization of investment procedures described herein.

Prewitt, Priestley Toulmin, James R. Craig, J. J. Finney, William D. Johns, Jen-Ho Fang, and Charles T. Burnham. I have also benefited greatly from suggestions made to me by Secretary Clark and Treasurers Bethke and Fisher, members of the various Councils of the Society, and those readers whose interest in The American Mineralogist prompted them to write.

Mary Holliman has served effectively as the Managing Editor, and the job would not have been possible for me without her. My secretary Vera Good has developed considerable skill in reorganizing and retyping author-submitted tables, and has thus contributed to the general improvement of the published
